Dr. Séan Hemingway specializes in Greek and Roman bronzes and has excavated prehistoric, classical, and Roman sites in Greece and Spain. He is the author of numerous scholarly publications, including *The Horse and Jockey from Artemision: A Bronze Equestrian Monument of the Hellenistic Period* (2004).

Dr. Ute Wartenberg Kagan has been the Executive Director of the American Numismatic Society since 1991. Her research interests focus on the early archaic coins and the economy of Greece and the Achaemenid Empire and particularly on the role of the earliest coins in electrum and silver in the 6th century BC.

Dr. Carol Mattusch specializes in classical bronzes, in particular the relation of technology, artistic styles, and the market in the ancient Mediterranean world. She has published extensively on ancient Greek and Roman art, and her books have won awards from the Archaeological Institute of America and the College Art Association.

Dr. John Oakley is a classical archaeologist whose main interests are Greek vase painting, iconography, and Roman sarcophagi. He is known as an expert on ancient vase painting and has taught at the College of William and Mary since 1980 where he is Chancellor Professor and Forrest D. Murden, Jr. Professor of Classical Studies.

Dr. Seth Pevnick has been Richard E. Perry Curator of Greek and Roman Art at the Tampa Museum of Art since 2009, and he advanced to Chief Curator in 2013. His most recent projects include curating the exhibition *Poseidon and the Sea: Myth, Cult, and Daily Life* (2014).

Dr. Peter Schertz has served as curator of Ancient Art at VMFA since October 2006 and the Jack and Mary Ann Frable Curator of Ancient Art since 2007. His specialty is Roman Art, with a focus on the intersection of art and culture, particularly art and religion.

Nicole Stribling has served as Curator of Permanent Collections at the National Sporting Library & Museum since 2013 and has also worked at the National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C., in the Exhibitions Department and the American and British Paintings Department.
