VMFA awards 27 fellowships to Virginia students and artists

Awards total almost \$5 million since 1940

The Virginia Museum of Fine Arts awarded 27 fellowships to Virginia art students and professional artists in 2014-15 for a total of \$162,000.

VMFA received 798 applications for the 2014-15 cycle, the highest number since the program's

inception. During the Fellowship Program's 74 years, the museum has awarded approximately \$5 million and 1,200 awards to Virginia's art students and professional artists.

"The Virginia Museum of Fine Arts continues its commitment to nurture artists throughout the Commonwealth," Director Alex Nyerges said. "We are grateful to the late John Lee Pratt of Fredericksburg for establishing a VMFA endowment that makes this support possible, as well as others who have contributed funds to further this mission-based objective throughout the years."

The juror for the professional fellowship awards was Tina Kukielski, co-curator of the 2013 Carnegie International and curator of the Hillman Photography Initiative, Carnegie Museum of Art, Pittsburgh, Penn.

Four graduate students won awards worth \$6,000 each. They are: Corey Piper, art history, **Charlottesville**; Nils Westergard, painting, **Falls Church**; Anna Hogg, film/video, **Hampton**; and Stephen Fuller, sculpture, **Richmond**.

In addition, undergraduate student Justin Garcia, film/video, of **Virginia Beach** was awarded a fellowship worth \$2,000 for his final semester.

The jurors for the undergraduate and graduate awards were: Graham C. Boettcher, Ph.D., William Cary Hulsey Curator of American Art, Birmingham Museum of Art, Birmingham, Ala., and Scott Habes, visiting professor of art in the Department of Theater, Art, and Graphic Design at Longwood University, Farmville, Va.

The fellowship funds come from a privately-endowed fund administered by the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts. The Fellowship Program was established in 1940 through a generous contribution made by the late John Lee Pratt of Fredericksburg

(the husband of Lillian Pratt, donor of the museum's Fabergé collection). Offered through the VMFA Art and Education Division, fellowships are still largely funded through the Pratt endowment and supplemented by annual gifts from the Lettie Pate Whitehead Foundation and the J. Warwick McClintic Ir. Scholarship Fund.
