

The painter Jacques Villon turned layers of shapes and colors into horses. Artists have to look carefully at what they want to draw, paint, or sculpt so they can make the same shape. What shape did Villon use for the horses' legs? Does it look like the horses are standing still or moving in the painting? Can you move like a horse?



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CONCEPT/OVERVIEW

Artists can use different lines and brushstrokes to show movement in their work. Vincent Van Gogh liked to paint outside. He painted this picture on a windy day. He used his brushstrokes in an energetic way that shows movement. Think about standing outside on a windy day. What is moving around to tell you it is windy? How would it sound? Look again at the swirls in Van Gogh's painting to see how he pictured the wind. Can you move your hands like the wind?

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CONCEPT/OVERVIEW

Artists show movement in their work by placing the subjects in action positions (leaning, walking, jumping, waving). There are many clues in the painting that tell us it was a windy day. Notice how hard it is for the horse, dog, and man to walk. Why do you think they are having a hard time? What other things in this picture let us know that it is a windy day?
