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

Plant seeds of creativity on this floral adventure! You'll discover depictions of flowers in the VMFA collection by locating the works described below and answering each question. At the end of the gallery hunt, sketch your own floral arrangement and complete the word search.

The adventure begins in the American Galleries on Level 2.



1

Find the decorative still-life painting that contains objects from around the world. It features quince blossoms, the white flowers in an Italian earthenware vase. Quince blossoms always have the same number of petals. How many petals are on each bloom?



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Proceed to the **East Asian Galleries**, also on Level 2. Find the flower commonly known as daffodil. Its other name belongs to the Greek mythological hunter who fell in love with his own reflection. What is this flower's other name?

In the **English Silver Galleries**, off of Tapestry Hall, a bountiful painting includes apples, grapes, chrysanthemums, and roses. If you were throwing a party suited for royalty, what fruit would you serve and what flowers would you use to decorate?

Go to the **European Galleries.** This Dutch painter combined fruits and flowers of different seasons. The pomegranates seen here usually ripen in autumn. Carnations, however, bloom in the season of renewal and the warmer season that follows. Name these seasons.

In the **French Galleries** on Level 3, you'll find a painting with poppies in its foreground. The artist, Claude Monet, usually worked *en plein air*, or outdoors. Place yourself in this Impressionist landscape. What do you see, hear, and smell?

In another Claude Monet work, just a few steps away, you can meet the artist's wife. The couple loved flowers and grew fuchsias, begonias, geraniums, and other plants around their home. What flowers and plants do you grow at home?

Now visit the **Art Nouveau Galleries.** There you'll discover works that light up a room. Look for the window covered with tree branches. What are the two types of blooms you see here?

Journey to the **South Asian Galleries.** Look for the majestic deity known for his compassion. He is seated on a special flower. An auspicious, or lucky, symbol originating in ancient India, this flower represents purity and enlightenment. Name the flower.
