Fine Arts & Flowers Returns to VMFA

Floral interpretations by statewide floral designers will be throughout the museum

Fine Arts & Flowers will return to the galleries of the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts November 5-9. This fall's exhibition will be the event's 12th anniversary, combining works of art in the museum's

permanent collection with unique interpretations in flowers and foliage.

Floral designers from more than 50 garden club chapters across Virginia interpret masterworks in VMFA's collection with floral arrangements throughout the galleries. Lectures by prominent floral arrangers, an evening gala, lunches, a Sunday brunch in bloom, a fashion show, a floral tea, handson flower arranging workshops, and other events will take place throughout the four-day exhibition. The participants are members of The Garden Club of Virginia, the Virginia Federation of Garden Clubs, and the Garden Clubs of Virginia. Admission to Fine Arts & Flowers and the museum's permanent collection is free.
